



Hon'ble Smt. Droupadi Murmu is India's 15th President, first leader from tribal community in office





Born in 1958 in Baidaposi village of Mayurbhanj district in Odisha state of India, Smt. Murmu belongs to the Santhal community, one of India's largest tribal groups. Daughter of a village council chief, she studied at the Ramadevi Women's College in the Odisha state capital, Bhubaneswar.

Beginning her career as a clerk for the Odisha government, Ms Murmu served as a junior assistant in the irrigation and energy department from 1979-1983.

After she quit her job in Bhubaneswar and returned to Rairangpur to take care of her family at the insistence of her mother-in-law, she took up a job as a teacher at the Sri Aurobindo Integral School. Her political career began in 1997 when she was elected as a councillor in the local polls in Rairangpur. She was often seen personally supervising sanitation work in the town, standing in the sun as drains were cleaned and garbage cleared.

She was elected to the state assembly twice - in 2000 and in 2009 - from the Rairangpur seat. She was appointed as the first female governor of the state of Jharkhand. She held the position for six years until July 2021. Smt. Murmu won appreciation during her tenure for keeping the governor's office open to people from all walks of life.

She is first leader from tribal community and second woman to become the President of India.



Belize Receives Donation of AstraZeneca Vaccines from Government of India

Beimopan, July 27, 2022. 4:45 p.m.

The Ministry of Health & Wellness and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs are pleased to announce that AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccines will now be available at vaccination sites countrywide thanks to a donation of 10,000 doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine by the Government of India.

The Government of Belize extends its gratitude to the people and Government of India for the invaluable donation of vaccines, which will help to protect our population against COVID-19. This is the second direct donation of vaccines that India has so generously provided to Belize.

The public is reminded that an unvaccinated person is 24 times more likely to suffer from severe illness and die due to COVID-19 when compared with vaccinated individuals. The Ministry of Health & Wellness, therefore, continues to remind persons, especially the vulnerable population such as the elderly, pregnant women and persons with underlying medical conditions, to protect themselves by getting vaccinated; continue to utilize a wel-fitted face mask, especially in crowded indoor and outdoor areas; and practice regular hand washing and sanitizing, and social distancing.

The Government of India has gifted 10,000 doses of AstraZeneca's COVISHIELD vaccines made in India by Serum Institute of India, to Belize. The consignment arrived on afternoon of 27th July, 2022 at the Belize City International Airport.

Officials from Ministry of Health & Wellness and Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Belize were present to collect the vaccines. Honorary Consul of India in Belize Mr. Arun Hotchandani coordinated with the Belizean officials to ensure smooth delivery of vaccines. The donation of 10,000 doses of Astrazeneca vaccines is part of the ongoing efforts of the Government of India under #Vaccine #Maitri programme to supply Covid vaccines to partner countries all over the world including in Latin America region.

The Belizean Government expressed their gratitude to the Government and the People of India, and in particular to Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri. Narendra Modi, for the donation of the vaccines through a official press release. The Health Minister in the same vein reiterated the scarce supply of vaccines and thanked India for the timely gift. This is second direct donation of vaccines that India has provided to Belize.



ECHOES OF GURUDEV TAGORE IN MEXICO- Cultural & Literary Outreach

Rabindranath Tagore was born on 7th May 1861. He was a great Indian polymath-poet, painter, philosopher, social reformer, playwright as well as composer. Rabindranath was mostly known for his poetry as he had written many novels, short stories, dramas, essays, travelogues, and thousands of songs. The rhythmic, optimistic, and lyrical nature which was mostly borrowed from the real-life of the people, was frequently noted.

Tagore's aesthetics represented an inspiration for the literary profession in Mexico. This was expressed in Vasconcelos's essay Indology, written in 1926. This is an example of how Tagore's voice became a guide for the literary profession at that time. Tagore offered inspiration and literary guidance to Mexican writers, poets and philosophers. Moreover, Mexican scholars of the humanities in the first two decades of the twentieth century considered the Bengali poet's literature as part of a global tradition where the voices of Asia and the Mesoamerican cultures spoke out in harmony.

Here I present some responses from the Mexican community to Tagore's Nobel Prize, especially by Vasconcelos and Octavio Paz (1914-1998). By surveying Tagore's reception in Mexico we can see how it is still valid and what The Atheneum of Youth founded in 1909 was a Mexican cultural, literary, philosophical and humanistic movement of the first quarter of the twentieth century did by leaving its footprints on time. Its intellectual activity drew the attention of the country as well as of various similar Latin American literary circles. At the heart of this movement was a discussion not only of European literature and philosophy but also of the Eastern traditions, particularly of Tagore's literature. The central problem was the access to his rich Bengali work but intellectuals like Vasconcelos brought about respect and recognition for India's literary and philosophical traditions. It was at that moment that the admiration for the Indian poet grew, along with Vasconcelos's re-reading of Indian texts that he shared with various Latin American writers. All this allowed Tagore's works to become a port of entry for South Asian culture.

The dissemination, impact and responses to Tagore's work increased in national importance when José Vasconcelos returned from exile to Mexico to occupy two strategic posts from 1920 to 1924. He was the Rector of the National University of Mexico and the head of the Ministry of Public Education. It was then that he distributed editions of Tagore's Nationalism, The Crescent Moon, Personality and Sadhana in Mexico along with works by authors like Tolstoy and Plato. In 2011, Vasconcelos's classic collection was reprinted in a historical context where reading classics becomes a habit again in the chiaroscuro of Mexican intellectual forays.


After Tagore's visits to Argentina, Vasconcelos always believed that Mexico should receive Tagore. Indeed, Tagore never visited Mexico, but this does not minimize the impact of his thought and literature. After Vasconcelos, the impact and response to Tagore's works broadened and, in the 1960's, they occupied a literary and poetic position that acted as a bridge between Mexico and India. The main protagonist in constructing this bridge was Octavio Paz. Paz, the Nobel Laureate of literature in 1990, recognized Tagore's work as a bridge between India's literary, philosophical, humanistic, and religious traditions and the world. Literary works provided in translations circulating in Mexico made Tagore's work relevant for all time.

Tagore's philosophy of education stresses the place of poetry, music as opposed to present-day education. Today, the humanities are allowed to be pushed into the background by various educational reforms. Martha Nussbaum's book 'Not for profit: Why democracy needs the Humanities' refers to Tagore as a defender of the humanities and art to promote a critical, humanistic and creative education. In 1964, the Centro de Estudios de Asia y África (CEAA) was founded as a specialized Centre of Studies at El Colegio de México, COLMEX, a prestigious research center focused on social sciences, where the study and research of Asian languages is part of the of postgraduate programmes in Asian Studies. Over the 1960's various projects of UNESCO focused on East-West relationship; one of these was the creation of this center in Mexico. Since its foundation it nurtured a high interest in philosophy, literature, history, religions, and even more in the study of classic and modern Asian languages. The study of Sanskrit, Hindi and Bengali by Ph.D. students, became the basis of a major project of translation from Asian languages into Spanish. This is the scenario from which some translations of Tagore's works from Hindi versions into Spanish have been published at Mexico. A recent example of this is the translation into Spanish of Kabuliwala in 2009.

Much more could be done by the present day scholars in popularizing thinkers and philosophers like Tagore and reviving the Chair at COLMEX on Indian Studies, International Relations could go a long way in bringing Tagore to the present day Mexico. That would be the greatest service what the Gurudev Tagore Indian Cultural Centre, GTICC, Embassy of India, Mexico City could do.

It was in May 2020 that Indian Prime Minister Modi made a clarion call for a Bharat that was "Aatmanirbhar". It is important to clarify what this meant and what it did not. While a rough translation of the word is no doubt "self-reliant", it is nevertheless not the kind of self-reliance that India arguably believed and practiced in the early years of its independence up until the seventies and eighties. It is easy to state what it is not. It is certainly not autarchy; it is certainly not inward-looking; and it is most certainly not stopping imports and making every product at home. It may be more prudent to think of "Aatmanirbharta" as Self-Reliance 2.0.

In this framework of Self-Reliance 2.0, the PM clarified that rather than be self-centred, India will open up even more to the world outside, guided by its motto: Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam, or our Earth is just one family. PM Modi went on to say that Aatmanirbharta will stand on five pillars: economy, infrastructure, technology, demography and demand. PM explained the raison d'être of Aatmanirbharta by saying that this should prepare India for participation in global supply chains and that this is a battle India cannot afford to lose.

There is little doubt that the global pandemic i.e. COVID-19, played a significant role in India's push for Self-Reliance 2.0. Take the simple example of PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) and N-95 masks. At the beginning of the pandemic, India was not making any N-95 masks. Today, India manufactures at least 200,000 N-95 masks a day, if not more. Even more impressive is India's own record of vaccinating its mammoth population. In 2020 when COVID emerged, almost no one believed India could ever fully vaccinate its population and that such an exercise would take years and years. Yet, in July 2022, about 18 months the first vaccination began, India completed 2 billion doses of vaccines for its citizens. The story of how this was achieved is worthy of a case study which will cover vital issues such as public-private partnership, centre-state cooperation and not to mention building awareness among citizens and getting their participation willingly in this exercise. Indeed, the WHO and others have praised India and the best practices here will be emulated the world over. Proving that Self-Reliance 2.0 is not just for Indians, India also exported a large number of vaccines and PPE countries all over the world. The latest statistics from the MEA website talks of 240 million (approx) vaccines which have been delivered to 101 countries, of which there are developed, developing and leastdeveloped countries. 15

The story of India being the pharmacy of the world is too well known to bear any repetition here. All of this is real "aatmanirbharta" at work.

The COWIN platform that India used for distributing vaccines to its mammoth population was remarkable. COWIN is essentially a cloud-based IT solution for planning, implementing, monitoring and evaluating COVID vaccination in India. By July 2021, India decided to make this open platform available to all countries for their use. In the COWIN global conclave organized in July 2021, as many as 142 countries in the world expressed interest in adopting this platform. Again, this is Aatmanirbharta at work.

The war in Ukraine has had a profound impact not just in Europe, but more importantly for developing and least-developed countries. Specifically, the war has impacted food, energy and commodity prices adversely. Wheat shortage in particular, is expected to affect Africa and the Middle-East quite significantly. At a time like this, it is comforting to know that India's position when it comes to food security for its huge population is satisfactory. This is yet another manifestation of Self-Reliance 2.0. Indeed, not only was India able to give away food-grains and lentils to 800 million of its citizens as part of the Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Yojana, India was also able to carry out modest exports of food-grains to low income countries that needed it. Again, Aatmanirbharta at work.

Yet another amazing success story of Aatmanirbharta is the case of Unified Payments Interface (UPI) which is a government-backed centralized digital payment gateway, widely popular in India. To understand the significance of UPI, consider this: India accounted for the largest number of worldwide digital transactions in 2021 at a whopping 48 billion, a number that is nearly three times bigger than China's (18 billion) and is at least six times bigger than the transactions of US, Canada, UK, France and Germany combined. Voices in the US are saying that we must learn from India which is leapfrogging into the future. Again, Aatmanirbharta at work.

The above is not to suggest that everything is rosy. India faces monumental challenges with regard to eradication of poverty, job creation and investment in health/education/skills of its vast population. But the lessons are clear: India is sui generis and it is only an "Indian" model that will work for India and Indians. Hence, the capital importance of Aatmanirbharta. After all, as we have seen above, 'Aatmanirbhar Bharat' is not just good for India but also for the world at large.



















































